Statuary buried with Nobles during Zhou Dynasty to protect them- Zhou dynasty (1122-221 BCE)

Statuary was used to promote the Epicurus' {341-270 BCE} ideas of moderation and pleasure

The Epicurean operation involves focusing 'cosmic' rays

Al-Kindi {AD 800-873 or 185-256 AH / 805-873 AD} wrote an important book on optics and the focusing of rays to destroy ships in the harbor

Al-Kindi was placed in a house of Wisdom, a retreat, a gathering of the intellectuals of the Persian Empire.

Epicurus promoted the idea of 'the garden' as a retreat for like-minded souls.

Epicurus was a Greek, his words are preserved mostly on stone engravings. However a Large library of Epicurean texts/scrolls existed in the House of Philodemus at the foot of Vesuvius. This library, covered by lava from the eruption {AD 79}, was discovered {1752 AD}, and the texts are still being excavated/preserved; slowly being translated.

J. Paul Getty had a replica of the "Philodemus" chateau built and this became the foundation of the Getty museum in California.

One of Al-Kindi's duties was to translate ancient Greek texts into Persian/Arabic and comment/explicate this knowledge.

Marsilio Ficino {1433-99 AD} was employed by Lorenzo De Medici to translate ancient Greek texts and comment/explicate them. Some of those translations led him to Al-Kindi's work and he incorporated those ideas into his own 'personal' works- without credit.

Al-Kindi wrote some medical texts on how to lengthen ones life via diet and belief.

Dr. Hu {before and after 1330AD} wrote a food and medicine book for Qubulai Qan. He was the 'family' doctor and though written and printed in Chinese/China he was probably a Turkmen and had knowledge of food and medical concepts from Persia to Siberia.

The Qan- Qubulai/Qenghiz etc were Mongols

Ficino was commissioned to write a dietary treatise on how to promote long life. {published in parts circa 1490 AD} The mystical/spiritual aspects of his work 'La Vita Longa' came from Platina, Al-Kindi, and a Book P... reputed to have been written by a Greek who lived and worked in Spain

The translator and publisher of Picagunshtraxosh by the Greek is in Seattle

The translators of Platina and Ficino got their degrees in Seattle

One of the translators of Soup for the Qan lives and works in Seattle

Al-Kindi's Caliph is reputed to have brought Chefs from Bolu Province in what is now Turkey.

There is a school of culinary arts in Mengen, Bolu -Turkey

The Journal of Culture and Cuisine that started me on this journey is published in California

An Editor for the journal resides in Seattle.

Dr. John Franklin, who helped me understand how Eastern European/Middle Eastern epics may have been sung- has his degree(s) from Seattle
